


The genre is undergoing a worldwide revolution. African Literary Agency presents the best authors of speculative fiction from the continent for your book, film, TV and/or audio projects.






The name Sauúti is taken from the word "Sauti" which means "voice" in Swahili. Sauúti is a five-planet system orbiting a binary star, rooted deeply in a variety of African mythology, language, and culture. Sauúti weaves in an intricate magic system based on sound, oral traditions, and music. It includes science-fiction elements of artificial intelligence and space flight, including both humanoid and non-humanoid creatures.



Nuzo Onoh

is a celebrated Nigerian-British writer of Igbo descent. Hailed as the 'Queen of African Horror', Nuzo's writing showcases both the beautiful and horrific in the African culture.

Two of her books will be launched in the UK in '24 and '25 and her series **African Magical Realism** is a new project to start as of this year. Nuzo won multiple awards - the Lifetime achievement Bram Stoker Award in 2023 and her most recent one a BSFA nomination for her short story The Maddening.

As a prolific writer throughout her career, Nuzo's success is not going unnoticed.

African Magical Realism - Nuzo Onoh

The African Magical Realism will be slightly different then Onoh's usual African Horror writing, which are stories set in Africa with solely African protagonists, showcasing African culture, beliefs and religions in a fictitious horror narrative.

Nuzo Onoh has recently been writing stories which feature both African and non-African protagonists, and are set in dual locations, both in Africa and outside Africa. These stories veer more towards the fantastical rather than core horror, albeit there are strong horror elements as well. One could call them horror-lite stories with strong magic and supernatural elements, hence the genre, African Magical Realism.

We believe that her fans would know once they see the phrase "African Magical Realism" added to any of her works, that they can expect to read a story that features multiple-racial protagonists and multiple settings, sometimes in the supernatural realm as well as in Africa, the West or even in Asia; we think of it as a new branding, an expansion of Onohs work.

AFRICAN REALISM SERIES

The books in the genre African Magical Realism/Horror do not constitute a continuous narrative but rather form a consistency through tone, genre and style. Each book contains a standalone story.

Bata becomes The Bride-Sentinel after defeating an evil Ghost-Bride, but her feat leads to her sudden death during a cleansing ritual. She is taken to Ibaja-La, a realm where dead brides go, and acquires the ghost-essence necessary to protect her from future attacks by malicious entities. Bata returns to earth, battles Ghost-Brides, saves the village chief's daughter, and is offered the opportunity to fulfil her dream of education in Lagos City.



This first novel of three features a unique magic system inspired by her home in central South Africa.


The Invisible Girl


