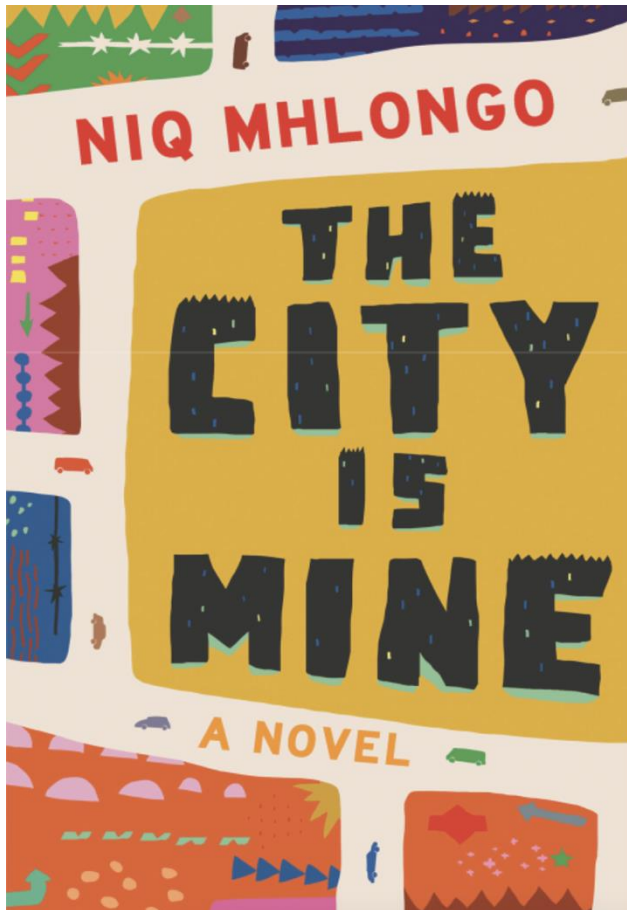

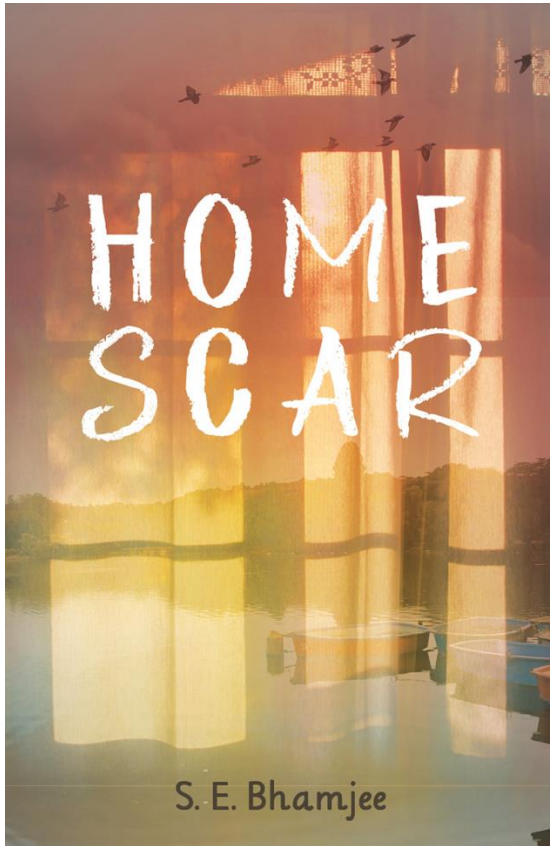

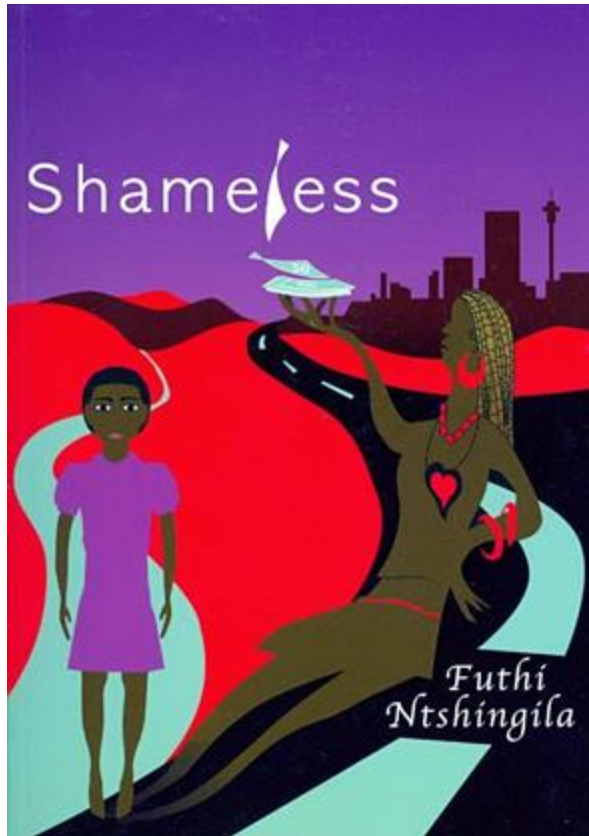

A South African story to be lauded

Liberation in South Africa, gender equality and affirmative action have introduced black women to management positions. But that is also stained by tokenism and inequalities for most women and blacks.

Shameless shows up these anomalies through two childhood friends, Zonke and Thandiwe. Zonke pursues a 'conventional' working life while Thandiwe takes the wild route of sex work. Sassy Thandiwe believes that as a sex worker, she doesn't prostitute herself worse than black/white corporate women and black men.

For instance, Kwena – a filmmaker who documents Thandiwe's life – sees a psychologist due to stress from work, thanks to the overbearing white mentor. That is as good as the white sex client who shot at Thandiwe because he was a pathetic male disaster.

Shameless exposes the thin line between what is progressive and backward in the lives and status of blacks in post-apartheid SA. It calls us to re-examine where the new dispensation has placed us: are gilded positions respectable, disgraceful or an excuse for survival?

The book is set up in a rhythm, much like the tide. The world, and the coast and indeed Cape Town, seen from three points of view: through the eyes of a seagull named Calypso, who needs to lay an egg to pass on some sort of legacy that is her identity and in many ways her past; through the eyes of Pooi, a homeless man who thinks he is the moon, and who needs to teach himself to swim in the sea; through the eyes of Hieronymus, a fat and greasy, once successful white architect, married to a beautiful, black British woman.

On That Wave of Gulls is an overwhelming, poetic and philosophical investigation into the abuse of a boy, a search for commonality at the edge of love and sexuality, and the resultant relationships that live in between men and women.

There is no simple answer to that, but I’d say with some confidence it shows us the beauty of existence, and the pain and rage of life – none of which we can really understand, but here we see it caught on the page for us, showing this corner of Cape Town. 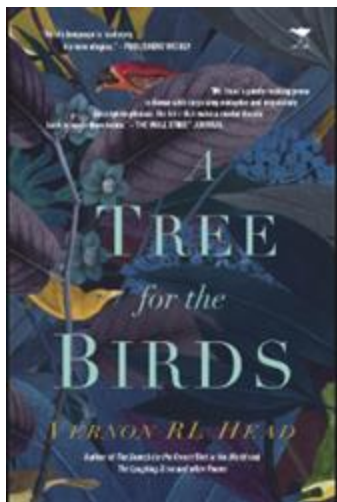

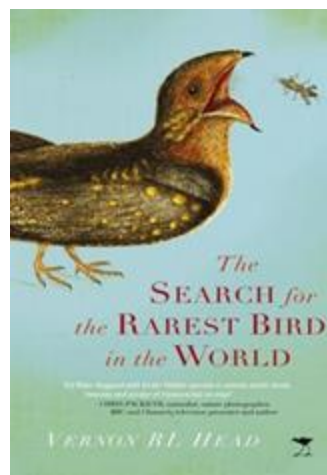

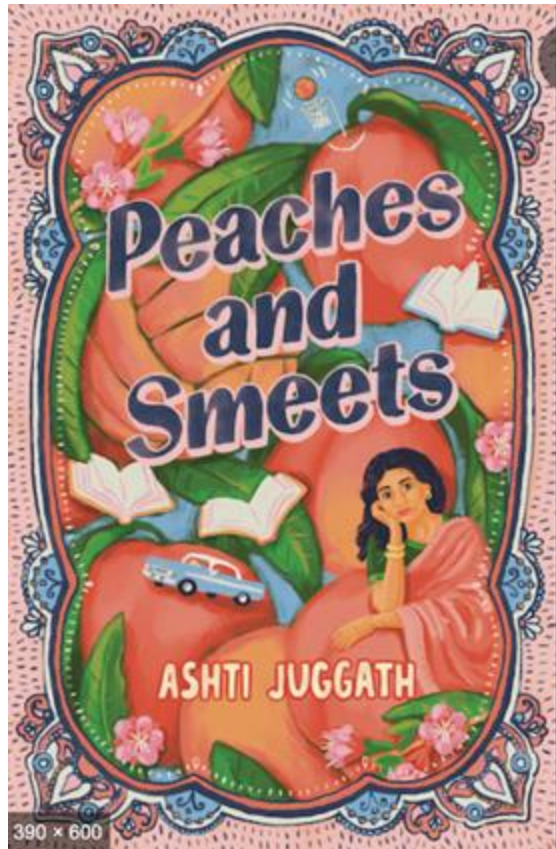

It was 6,900 kilometers from home in Cape Town in sweltering, overwhelming, heat of the inky black jungle. Architect and bird watcher, Vernon Head, stood with a spotlight in hand, on a remote jungle mountainside in Ethiopia's Great Rift Valley looking for something few on earth had seen before.

For 26 years, the most famous wing in the world has lived in a drawer in the ornithology branch of the British Natural History Museum. The bird to which it belonged is unknown to science. So began the search for *Caprimulgus solala*, the rare nightjar with "only one wing."

Growing up in Bakerton, Springs in the 1950s and '60s, Smita (Smeets) Maharaj is puzzled by a great deal of adult behaviour. Why must her tall, handsome father be so obsequious to the police? Why must brown people sit in separate train carriages from white people? Why can't her mother see how much more important it is for her to get a good education than to learn to make the perfect roti?

Caught between the beloved traditions of India and life in a quickly modernising South Africa, between family roots in Natal and a prosperous present in the Transvaal; between the madness of apartheid and the pull of her own desires, Smita struggles to find her feet in a world beset by contradictions. As the Maharaj family expands and grows, and her mother's twin obsessions with producing a son and finding suitable boys for her daughters to marry dominate the family's discourse, Smita wrestles with satisfying her parents' wishes and following her own path as she navigates her way through school and life - and comes to terms with a long-held, painful family secret.

Ashti Juggath grew up on the beautiful KwaZulu-Natal North Coast. She often spent time in Springs on the East Rand, the predominant setting for her first novel. *Peaches and Smeets* is her first novel, which she wrote believing that the stories of the past needed to be captured for posterity. Ashti currently lives in a leafy suburb in Johannesburg with her husband, three children and many books.

On the day she entered her arranged marriage, Hara's mother had a piece of advice for her—"Harachigi, my daughter, a woman is like a tree. She must stay rooted to her husband and her marriage, yielding good fruits and offering a broad shade to the family she's been blessed with. A tree can never uproot itself and fly, no matter how much it stares into the sky."

In obedience to this traditional belief and her religious indoctrinations, Hara endures seventeen years of a violent and abusive marriage to Brother Pious, a religious tyrant and bigot with an addiction to internet dating sites.

Nuzo Onoh possesses a compelling writing style that blends humor with a stark portrayal of reality. "The Tree that Flew" captures the protagonist's journey, filled with challenges, dreams, anxieties, and unwavering determination. The narrative is powerfully persuasive.

The Tree that Flew explores an abused wife's diasporic alienation and her desperate attempts at assimilation in a hostile new world that challenges all the cultural and religious beliefs that have kept her chained in her soul-crushing marriage to a religious and womanising bigot. Yet, in the midst of this cold new land, England, are warm-hearted allies who gradually teach Hara the meaning of self-love, self-respect, self-esteem, and every positive 'self' there is. Finally, she is guided to self-realisation and the road to redemption, giving her the courage to unshackle herself from her matrimonial, religious and cultural chains.

Realizing it needed to start with young people, Ndhlovu set up the Black Mermaid Foundation, which works to create diverse representation in ocean spaces, in sports, in careers and recreationally.
