Shameless

A South African story to be lauded

Liberation in South Africa, gender equality and affirmative action have introduced black women to management positions. But that is also stained by tokenism and inequalities for most women and blacks.

Shameless shows up these anomalies through two childhood friends, Zonke and Thandiwe. Zonke pursues a 'conventional' working life while Thandiwe takes the wild route of sex work. Sassy Thandiwe believes that as a sex worker, she doesn't prostitute herself worse than black/white corporate women and black men.

For instance, Kwena – a filmmaker who documents Thandiwe's life – sees a psychologist due to stress from work, thanks to the overbearing white mentor. That is as good as the white sex client who shot at Thandiwe because he was a pathetic male disaster.

Shameless exposes the thin line between what is progressive and backward in the lives and status of blacks in post-apartheid SA. It calls us to re-examine where the new dispensation has placed us: are gilded positions respectable, disgraceful or an excuse for survival?








Olubunmi Familoni



NEW! The Question Mark at the End of Life

In *The Question Mark at the End of Life*, Olubunmi Familoni peels back the skin of womanhood to expose what's underneath—grief, silence, rage duty, love, longing, and what it costs to carry them all. These twelve stories burn through the expectations placed on women's bodies, voices and identities, asking what's left when everything is claimed but nothing is given back.

In the title story, a widow tries to resurrect her husband by calling his name like a prayer, but what returns is not peace, but an unrelenting haunting. In A Woman's Knees Are for Suffering, a girl learns to cook kneel, and disappear, trained to be a wife long before she wants to be. When a Woman Becomes Water captures the quiet suffocation of woman whose words are too much for her husband, but not enough to save herself, until she turns them into stories.

Familoni's voice is poetic and unflinching, with a sharp sensitivity to human vulnerability. The collection is marked by themes of bodil autonomy, religious hypocrisy, patriarchal oppression, and psychologica suppression—particularly as experienced by women. The stories are independent yet thematically unified, each one offering a different perspective on the central question posed by the collection's title: what remains at the end of loss, betrayal, or silence?

As the mystery unfolds, with an aura of retrieved memory, the narrator's lost love becomes an increasingly evocative presence.




Vernon Head

The book is set up in a rhythm, much like the tide. The world, and the coast and indeed Cape Town, seen from three points of view: through the eyes of a seagull named Calypso, who needs to lay an egg to pass on some sort of legacy that is her identity and in many ways her past; through the eyes of Pooi, a homeless man who thinks he is the moon, and who needs to teach himself to swim in the sea; through the eyes of Hieronymus, a fat and greasy, once successful white architect, married to a beautiful, black British woman.

On That Wave of Gulls is an overwhelming, poetic and philosophical investigation into the abuse of a boy, a search for commonality at the edge of love and sexuality, and the resultant relationships that live in between men and women.



The Search for the rarest Bird in the World

It was 6,900 kilometers from home in Cape Town in sweltering, overwhelming, heat of the inky black jungle. Architect and bird watcher, Vernon Head, stood with a spotlight in hand, on a remote jungle mountainside in Ethiopia's Great Rift Valley looking for something few on earth had seen before.

For 26 years, the most famous wing in the world has lived in a drawer in the ornithology branch of the British Natural History Museum. The bird to which it belonged is unknown to science. So began the search for *Caprimulgus solala*, the rare nightjar with "only one wing."

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


